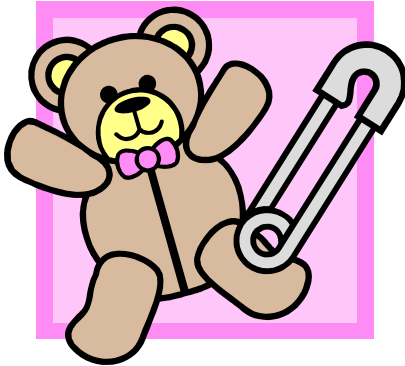

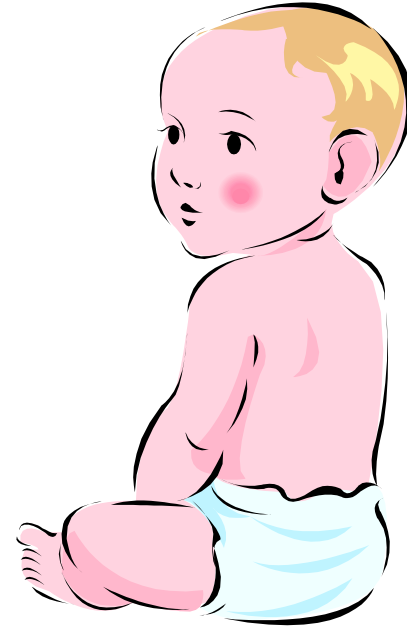

Our 2008 Athletic Teams

- **Women's Golf**

- Won the conference, Southern California and State Championship after finishing the season 37-3.

- **Men's and Women's Cross Country**

- Men's team brought home the first Western State Conference Title in school history.
- Women finished in third place at the conference meet.

- **Men's Soccer**

- Three men's soccer players received All-WSC honors.

- **Women's Soccer**

- Five women's soccer players earned all-conference accolades.

- **Volleyball**

- Finished in second place with a 7-3 WSC record. Also made first ever appearance at the State Championships.

Program Accomplishments

Program Development

- **Allied Health**

- **Firetech** has grown from a little over 100 students to over 300 students and is the proud owner of 3000 feet of fire hose donated by El Camino College.
- **EMT** has added an introductory course to help students be better prepared and to give students under 18, something to do while they wait to enter the program.
- **Nursing** continues to expand with 256 students enrolled.
 - A partnership was added with SEIU, a healthcare workers union for a career ladder program and Kaiser Permanente.
 - With grant funds. Nursing purchased the top of the line human patient simulator whose eyes dilate, he sweats and changes skin temperature, talks etc. We are pursuing different avenues of partnership to develop a simulator site for participation by hospital staff including doctors and nurses and COC students.
- **Administration of Justice**, with new Public Safety director **Steve McLean, Bob Brode** is developing a Homeland Security Program

- **Administration of Justice Program**
 - Currently developing an A/S degree in Homeland Security.
- **Anthropology**
 - Offering of new class: Anthropology 105 (Introduction to Archeology and Prehistory).
 - Opening of new Anthropology Lab at CCC and related lab sections.
 - Developing an Honors class for Anthropology 103 (Cultural Anthropology).
- **Business**
 - Establishing Retail Management Certificate (related to new programs).
 - Working with local community in supporting Youth Entrepreneurial Program.
 - Creating new online courses which were submitted to curriculum, including BUS 117 (Business Entrepreneurship), BUS 185 (Principles of Importing and Exporting), and BUS 142 (Principles of Selling).
- **Communication Studies**
 - Expanding Forensics Program.
 - Teaching Honors course this semester (COMS 105 H: Speech Fundamentals).
 - Hiring of one new fulltime instructor scheduled.
- **Computer Information Technology**
 - Offering courses in Office 2007.
 - Offering 090L (CIT Lab) for the first time.
 - Offering Quick Books II in the fall.

- The **Counseling Department** has expanded its online services to not only provide online counseling classes and online counseling but we also just started online multimedia tutorials on the following topics:

- **Economics**
 - Offering new course, ECON 230 (Comparative Economic Systems).
 - Rising enrollments for ECON 170/HIST 170 (Economic History of the U.S.).
- **History**
 - Offering several new courses this semester, including HIST 116 (The African American Experience in the U.S., 1619-1877), HIST 117 (The African American Experience in the U.S., 1870-Present), and HIST 198 (Special Topics in History).
 - Awaiting approval for Honors class to add to curriculum (HIST 111H: United States History I).
 - Hiring of one new fulltime instructor scheduled.

- **Paralegal**

- Paralegal Studies Department sponsored the Law Appreciation Day where students learned about careers in law.
- Further, Paralegal Studies Department submitted its application for initial approval with the ABA.
- Finally, Paralegal Studies offered an essay contest where the winner attended a black-tie dinner where Chief Justice John Roberts of the United States Supreme Court was the keynote speaker.

- **The Purchasing Department** worked with the Project Managers for the newly completed Aliso Lab, Aliso Lecture Hall, Hasley Hall and Canyon Country Campus to:

- Develop standardizations for furniture for the typical classrooms, computer labs, conference rooms and offices
- Develop furniture layouts and furniture selection for the non-typical areas as well, e.g., Board Conference Room and Board Room, foyers of Hasley Hall, cinema room, library and TLC, ECE and A&R to name a few
- Ensure that furniture for the opening of these projects was delivered, installed and set-up within the required timeframes. We believe the furniture is a beautiful compliment to the various projects.

- **Psychology**

- The AA degree (currently awaiting state approval) was developed.
- Department is scheduled to hire one new position & one replacement (for Mark Rafter who is retiring).
- Several department members went to B.C. Canada with the Psych Club/Psi Beta last May to attend the Western Psychological Association. They are scheduled to go to the WPA again in Irvine this April, with the Psych Club/Psi Beta students

- **Service Learning**

- Chief academic administrators and higher-education leaders has selected the College of the Canyons for inclusion in Beyond the Books' inaugural Guide to Service-Learning Colleges and Universities.
- This semester, a late start, one-unit, transferable introductory course will be offered: Service-Learning 100
- Last semester, 355 students earned Service-Learning certificates. They worked with 25 faculty members and 57 community-based organizations

- **Sociology**

- Offered new class: Sociology 209 (Sociology and Religion in the United States).
- Having great success with 1-unit special topic classes, including “Stepping Outside the Box: Deviance In a World of Conformity” and “Sexual Politics Redefined: Varied Meanings of ‘Sexualities.’”

- **Social Science & Business**

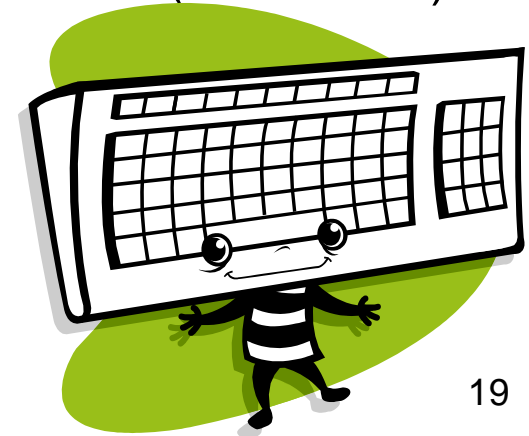
- Worked to establish the following interdepartmental-community based projects:

- COC hosted “**Focus the Nation**” on January 31st to help develop support for **Sustainable Development** on campus in in the community.

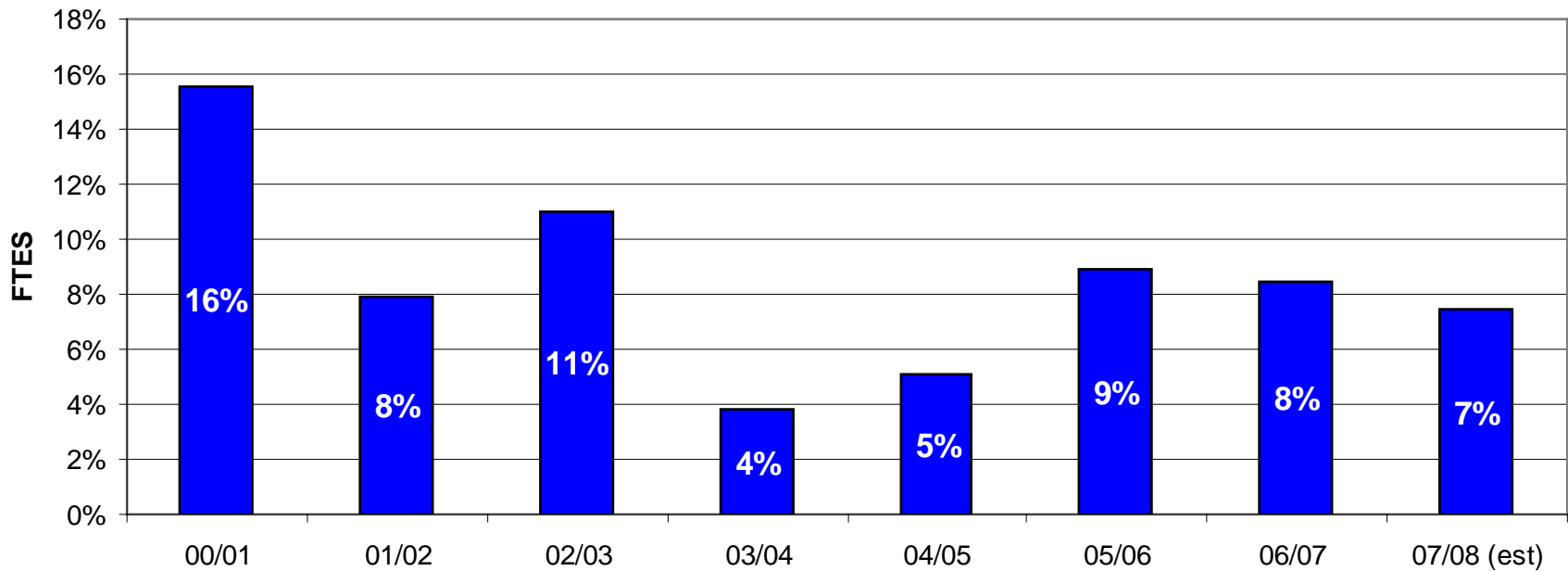

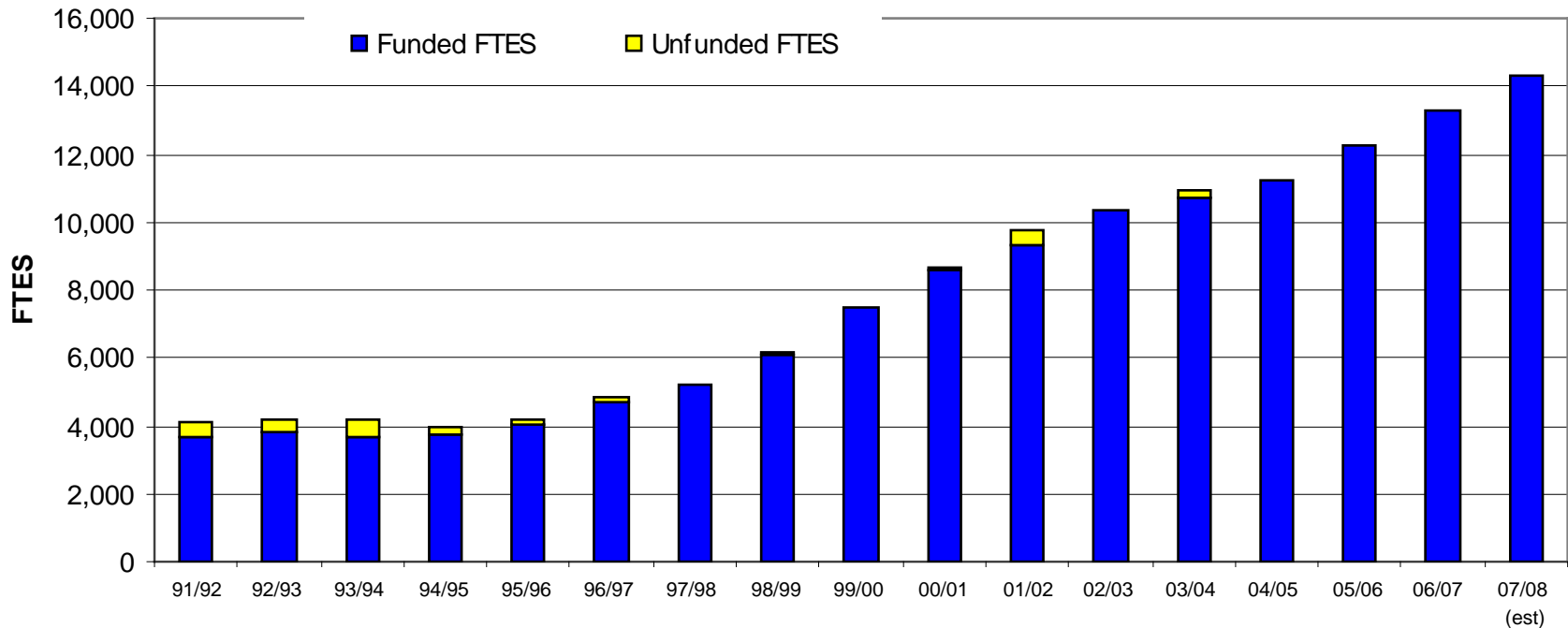

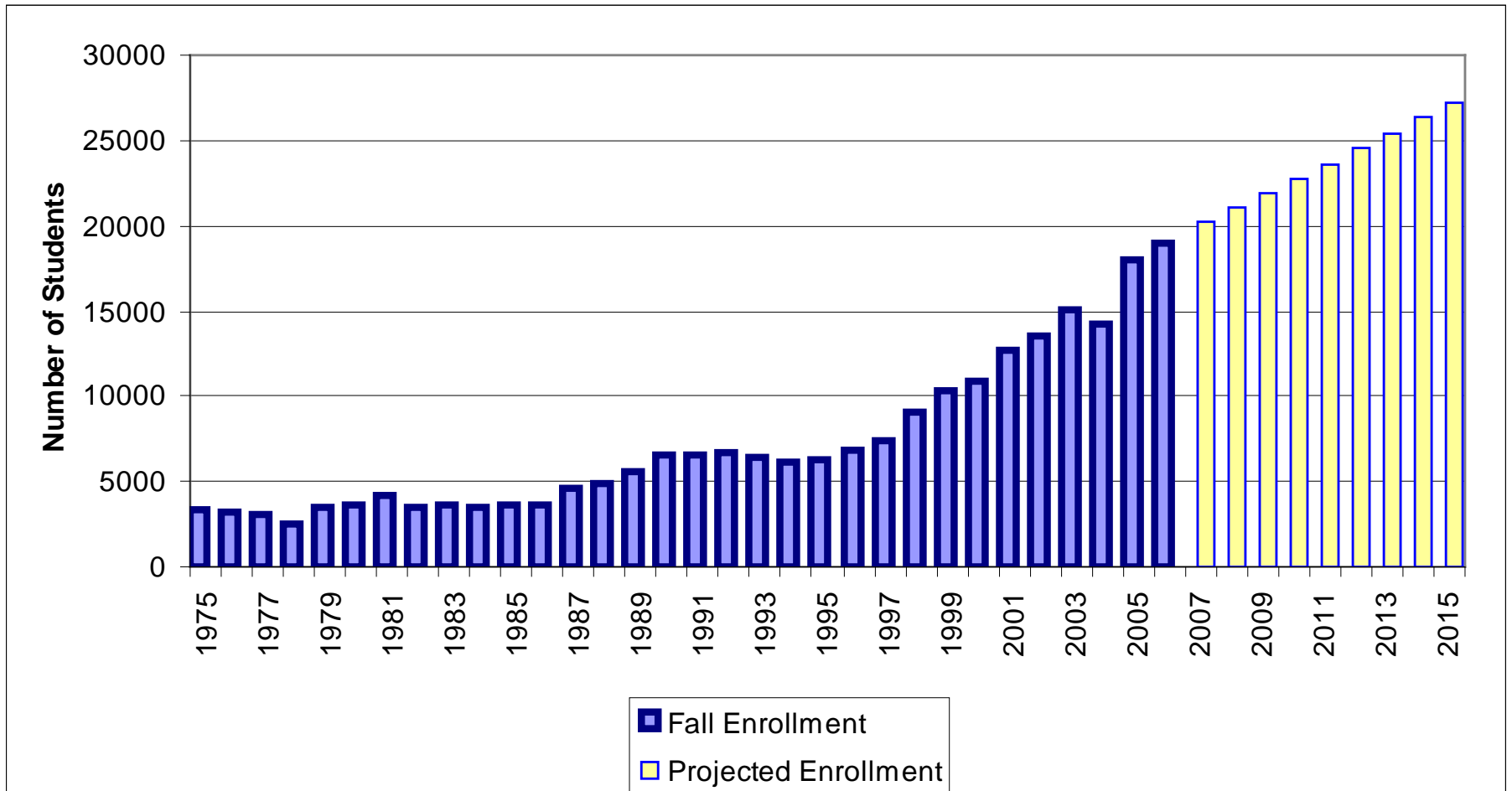

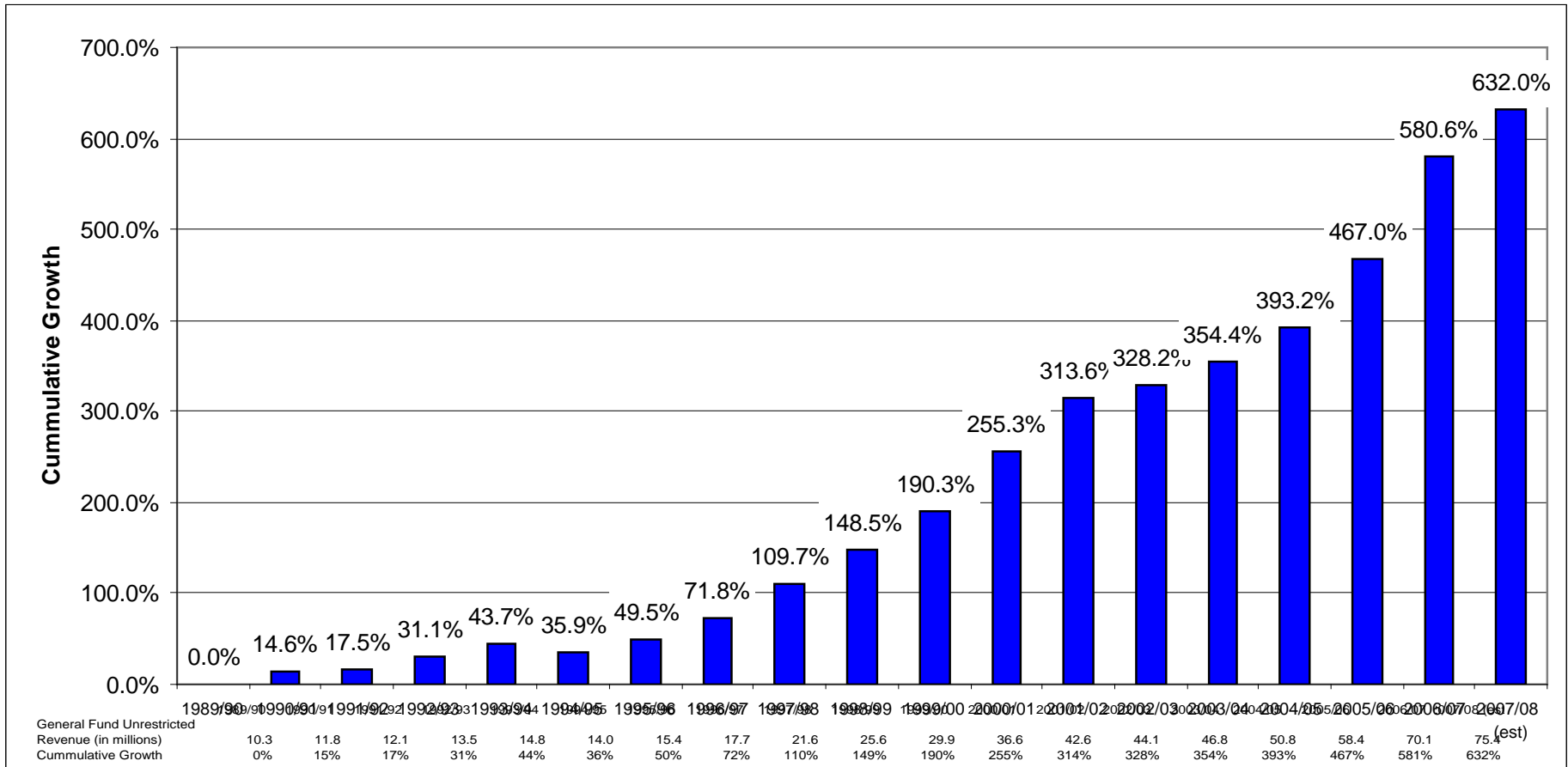

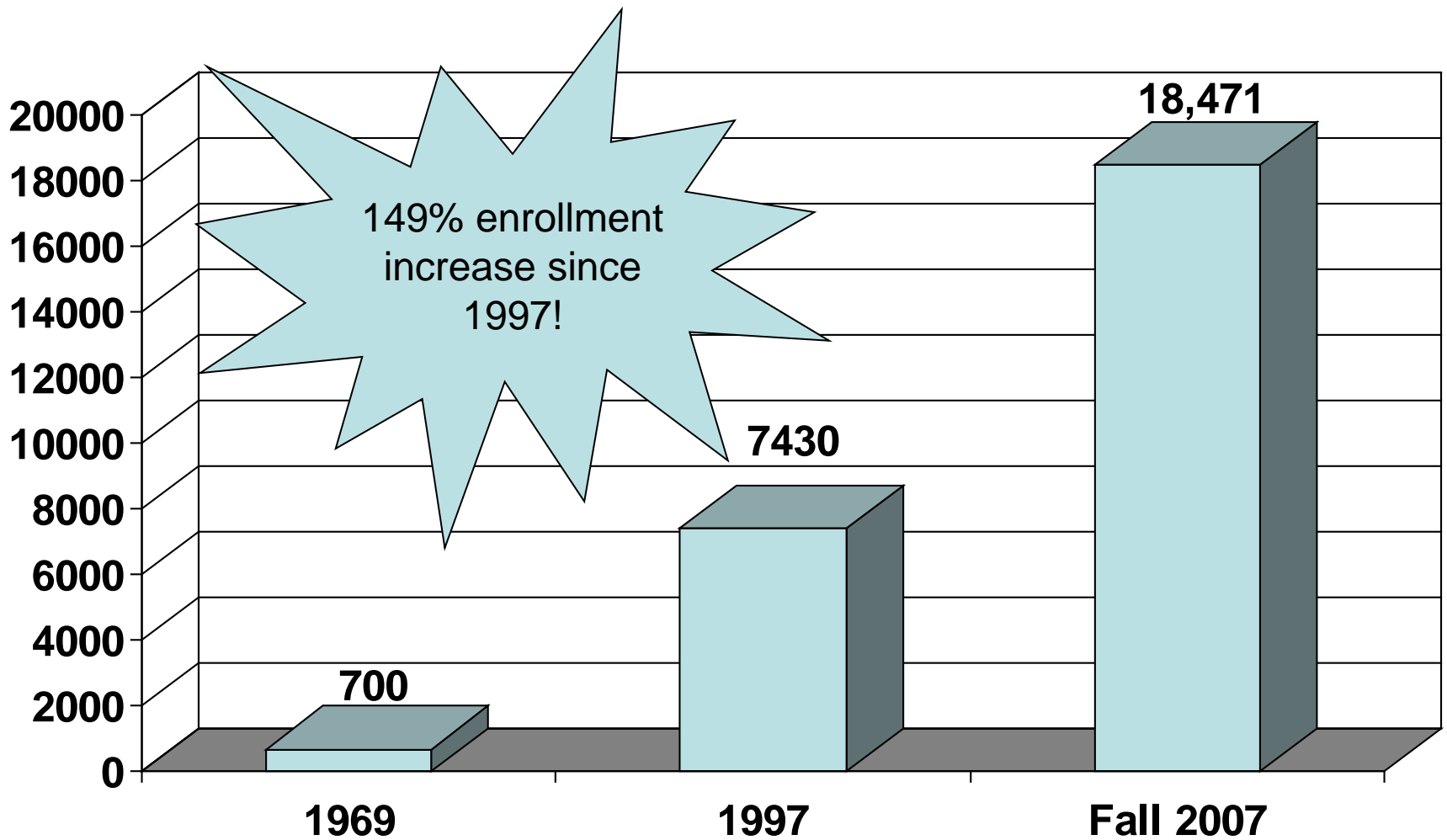
Growth in Number of Sections



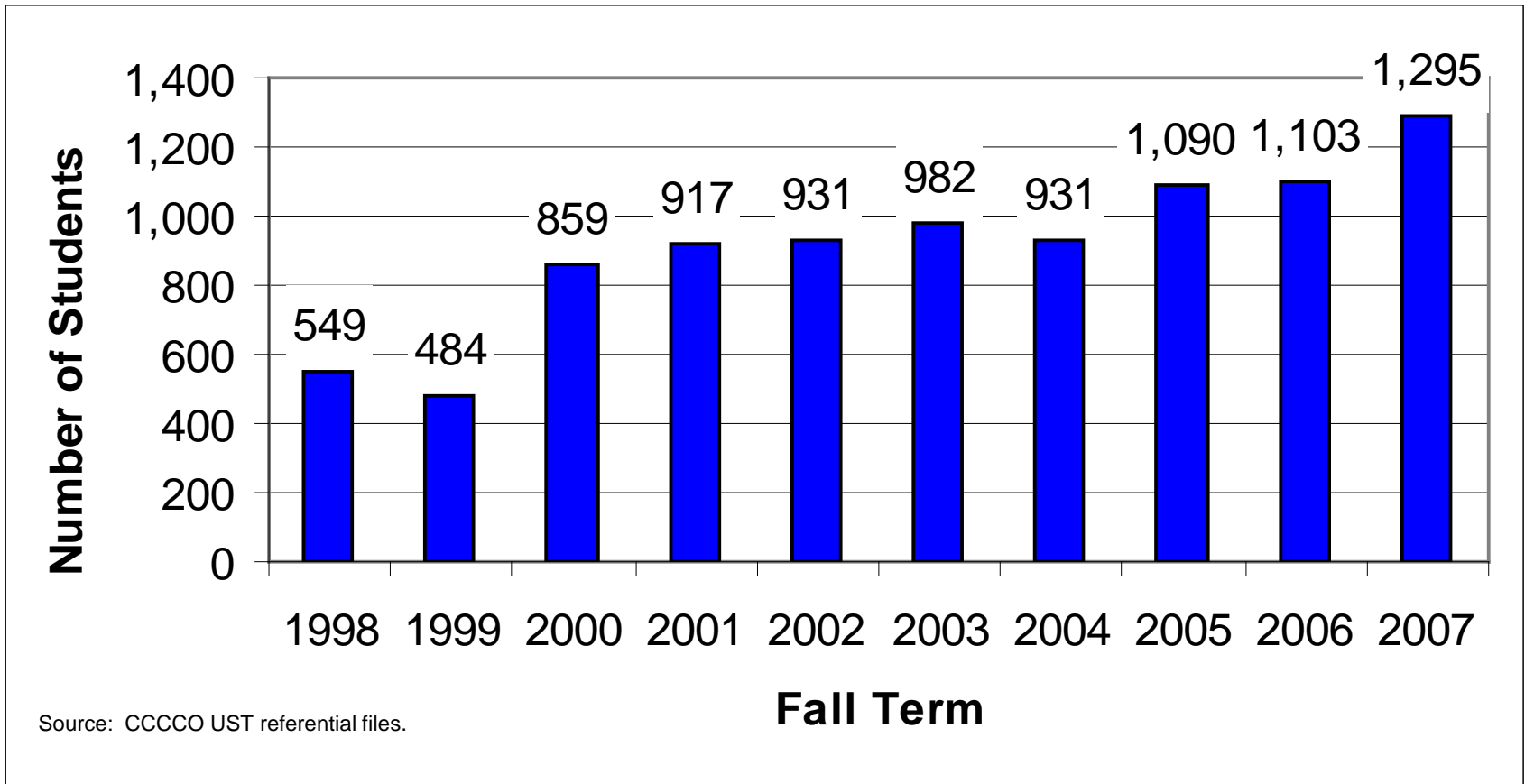
Santa Clarita Community College District Cumulative Growth In Unrestricted General Fund Revenue 1989/90 - 2007/08

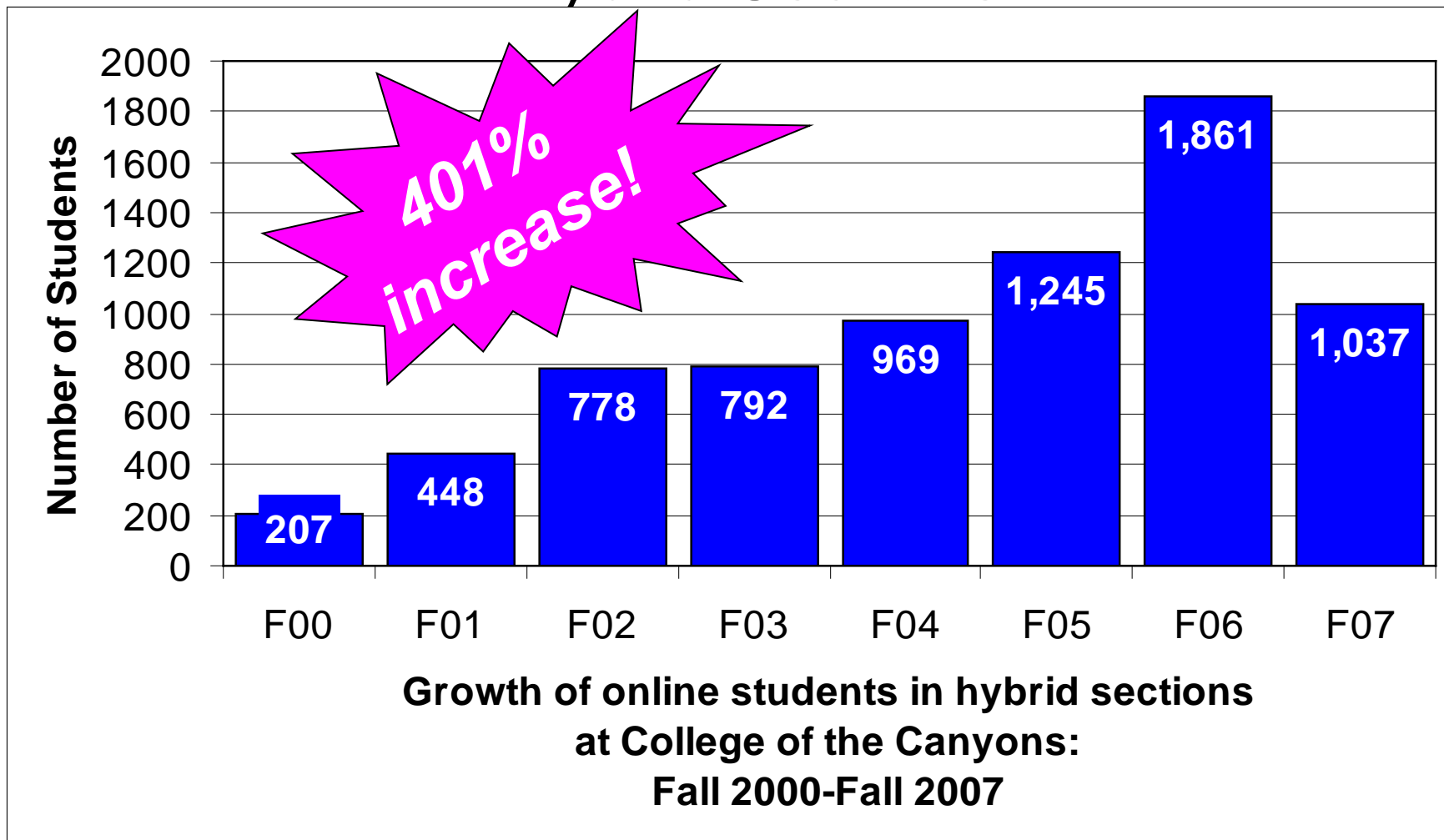

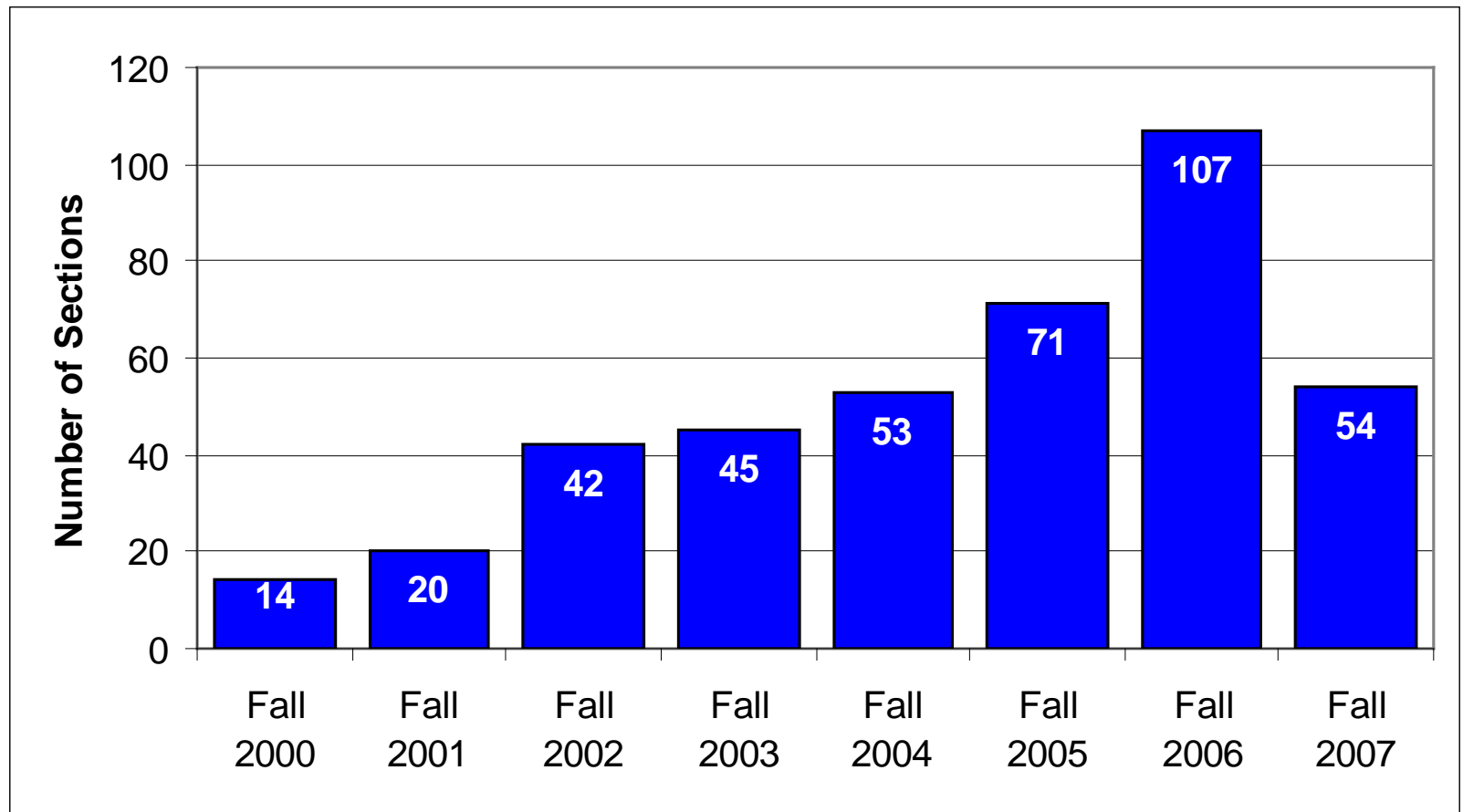

Growth of Online Students in Hybrid Sections



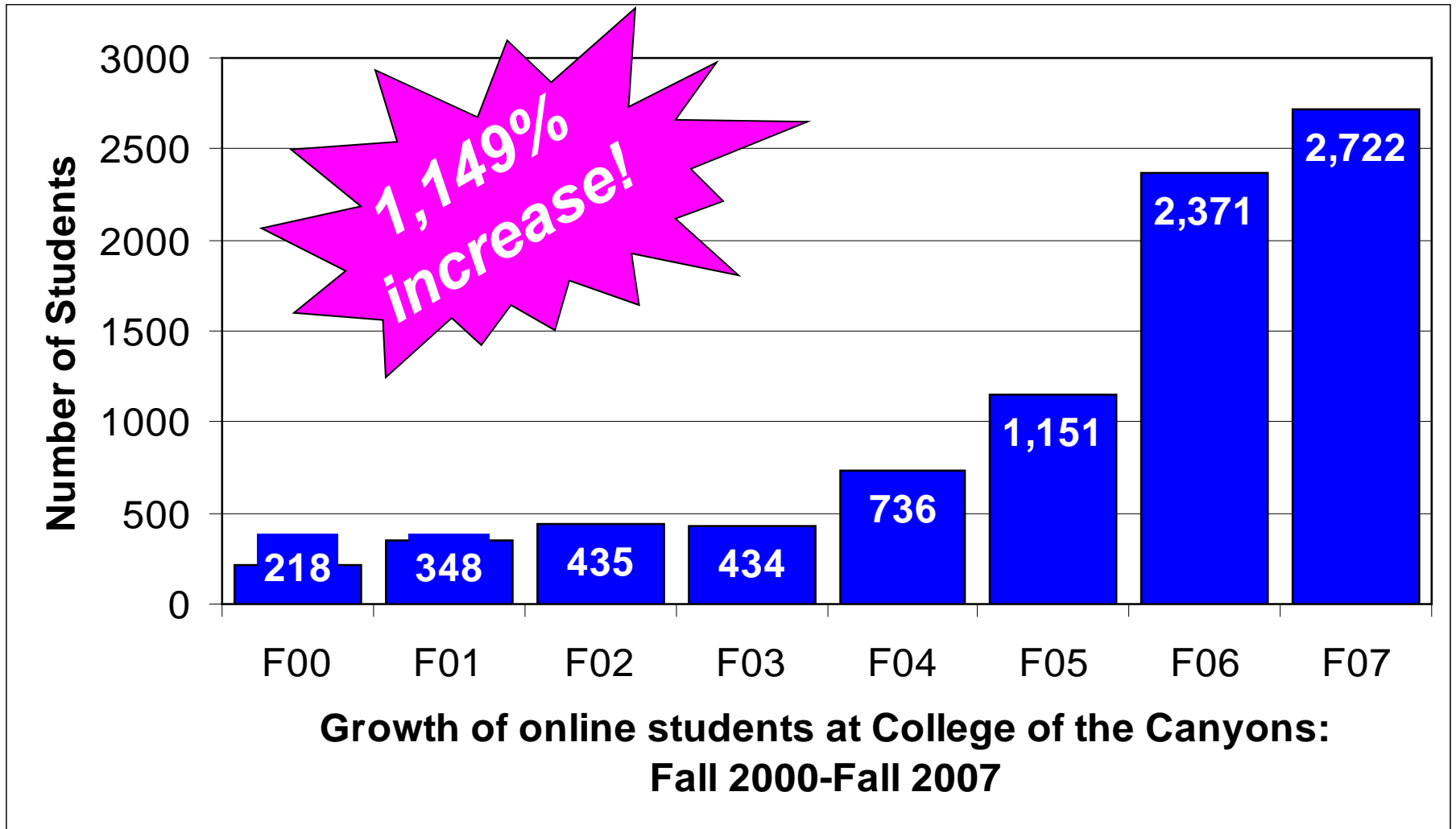

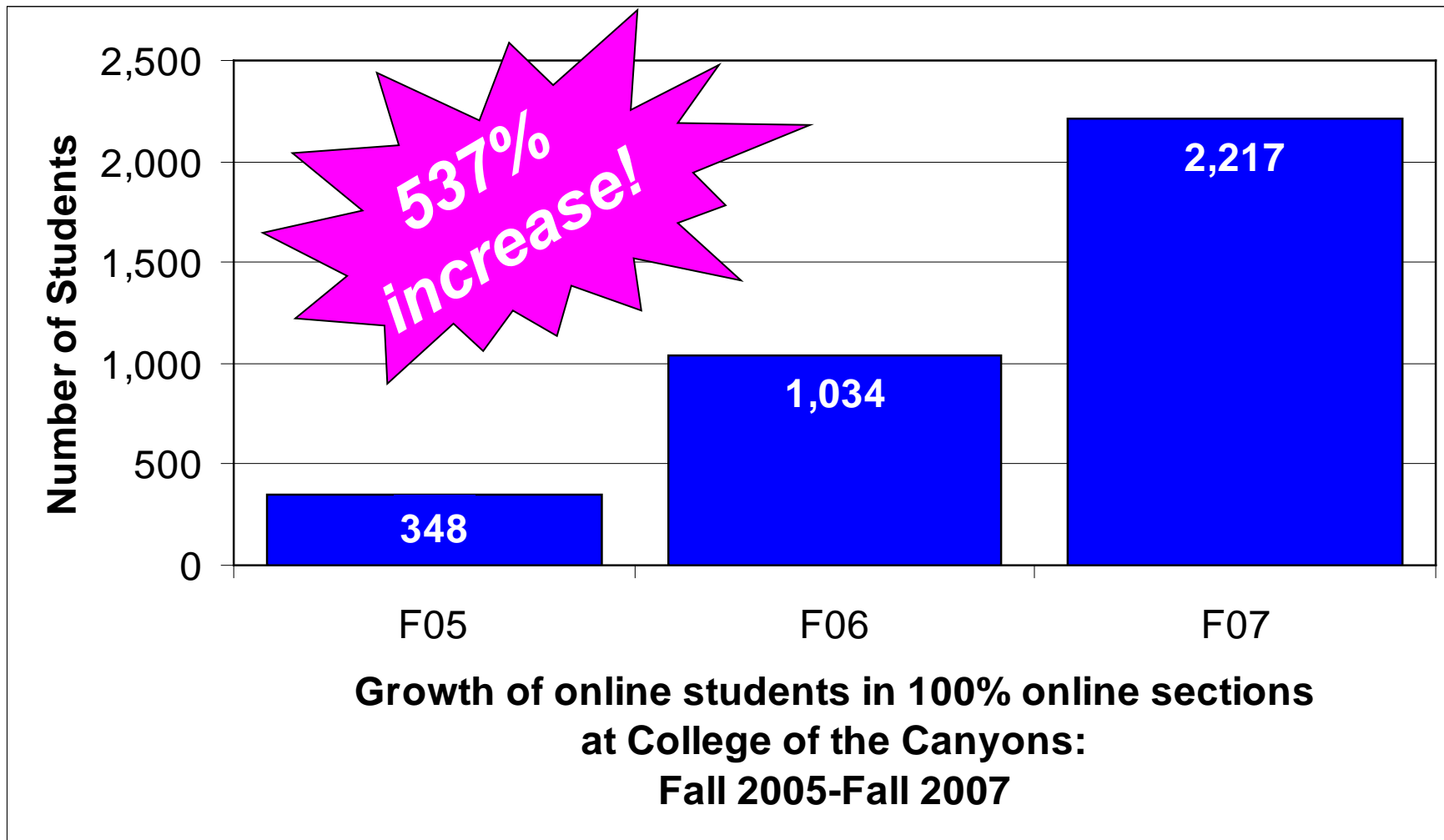

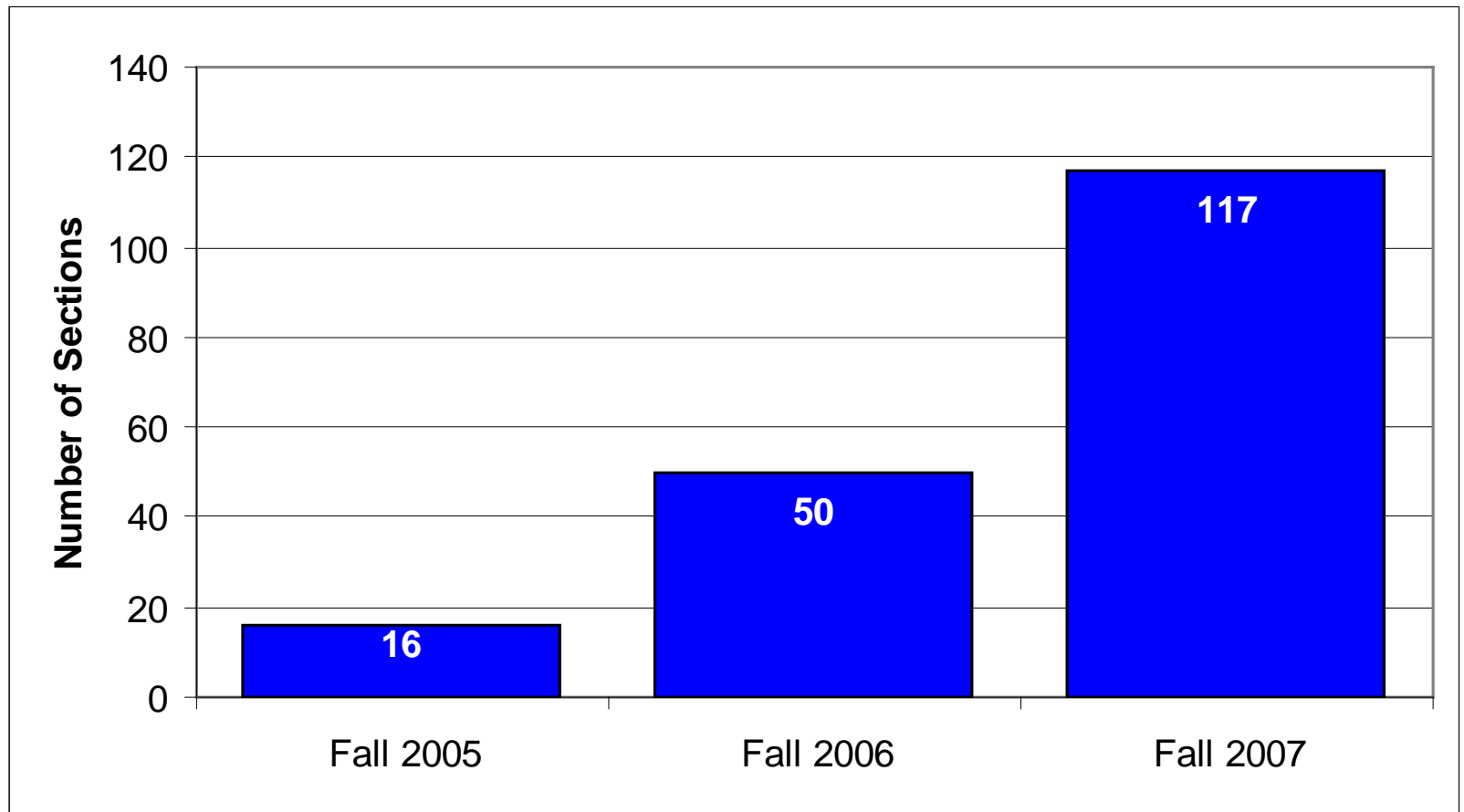
Growth of Online Students

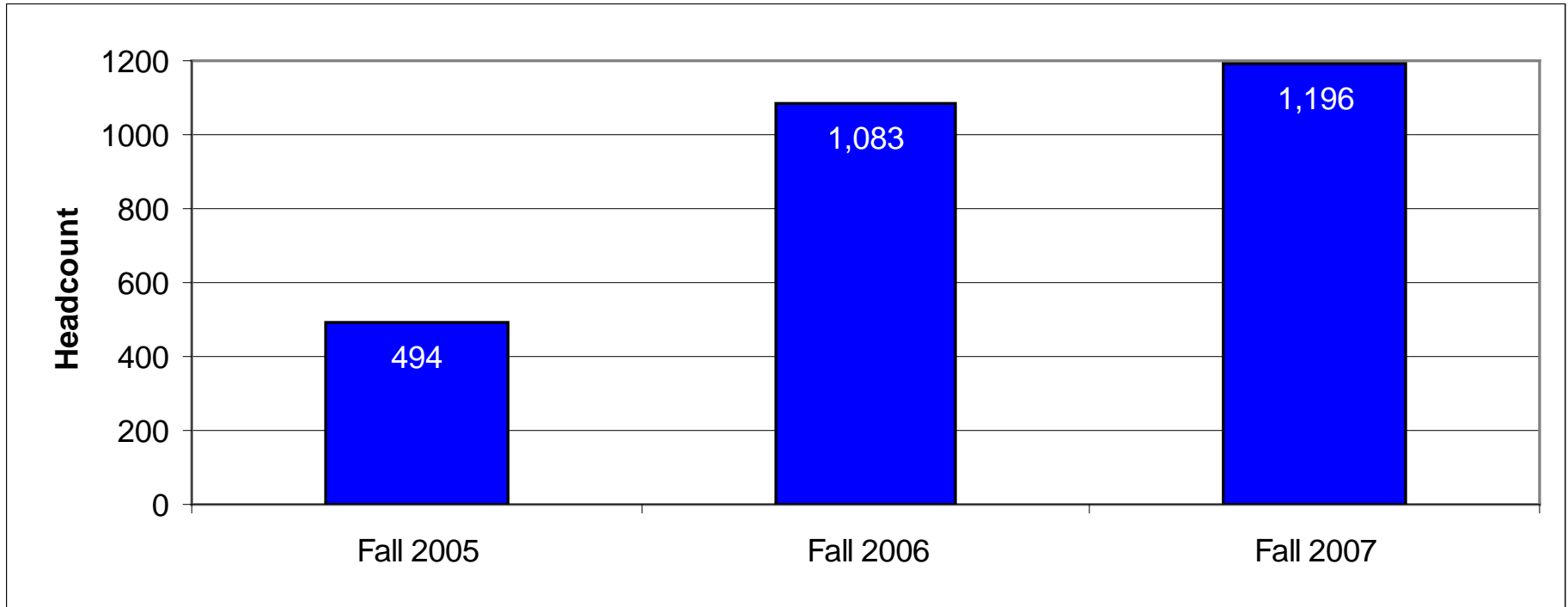

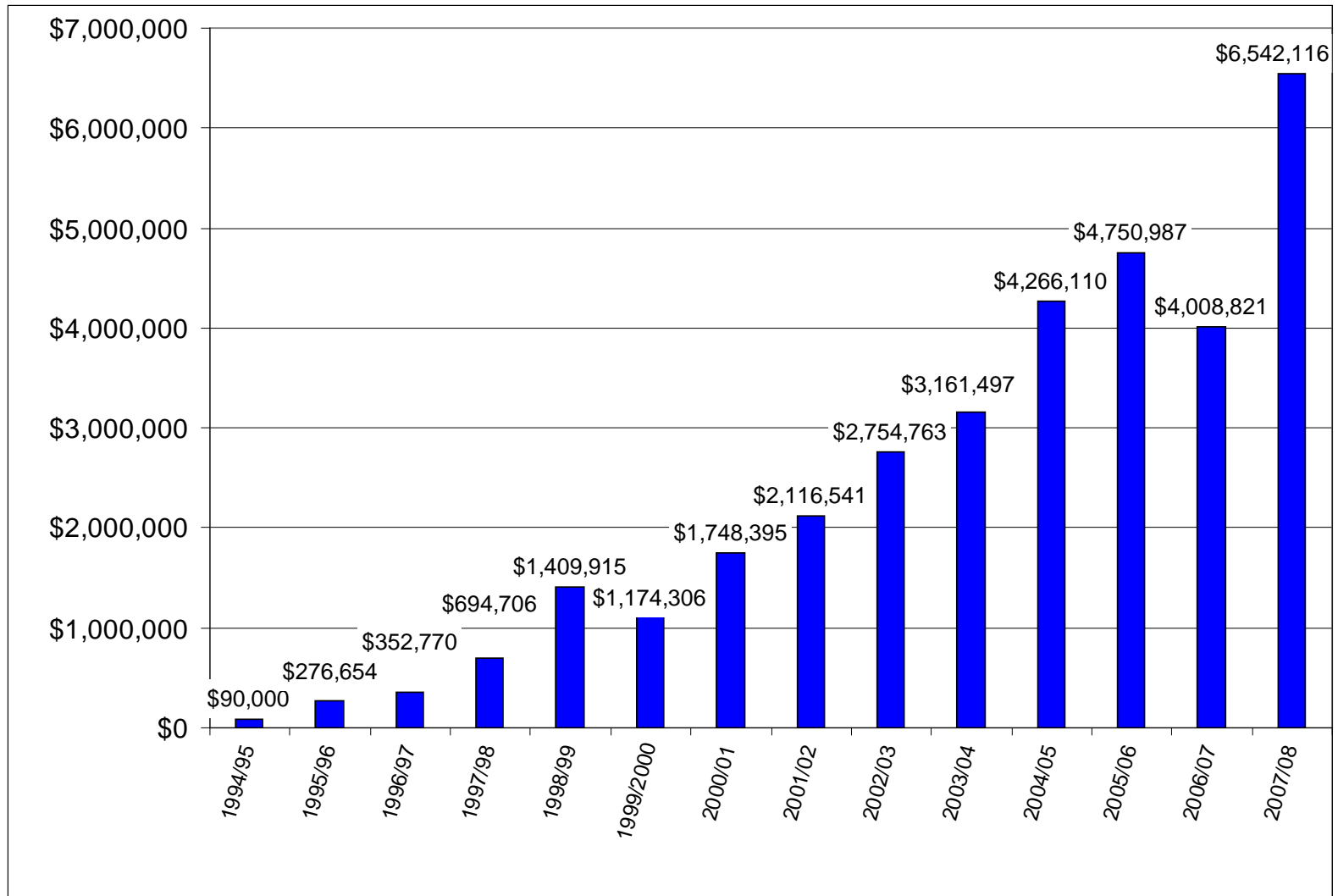

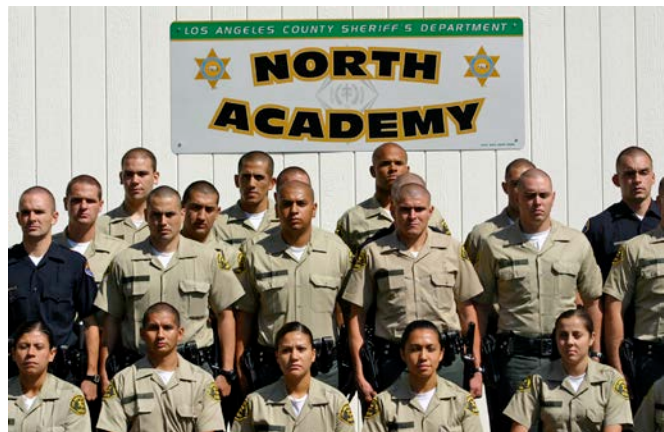

- Hasley Hall (formerly referred to as the Classroom/High Tech Center) is a GO-Funded 58,348 sq. ft. high-tech building which opened in time for Fall 2007.
- The building provides instructional space for computer information technology, business, economics, computer science, cinema and journalism as well as faculty offices and other support spaces including Distance Learning and PACE.

- All the lower level classrooms have been completed as well as the Board Room.
- At this point we are awaiting the Board Room furniture and installation.

PE Expansion & Tennis Courts—Next Steps

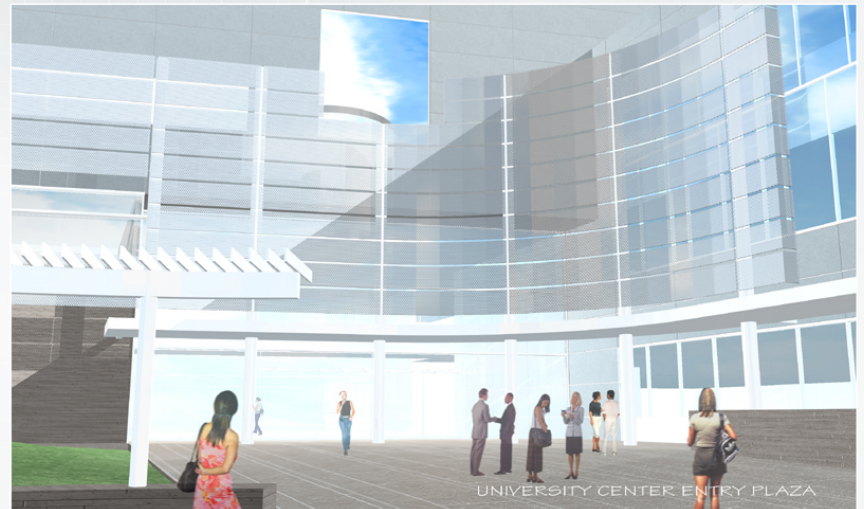
- Project is a GO Bond-funded/State match project that includes the construction of a 21,543 sq. ft. addition to the existing PE facility as well as six tennis courts as outlined in the Facilities Master Plan. The added facility will allow the college to offer new team sports and general education courses such as wrestling, badminton and tennis.
- The pouring of the tennis courts will take place shortly.
- The exterior of the building finish has been completed. 85% of the drywall has been completed, and 85% of the above-ceiling utilities have been installed.
- The installation of the basketball stops will take place shortly, and the installation of the acoustical wall panels is continuing in the gymnasium.

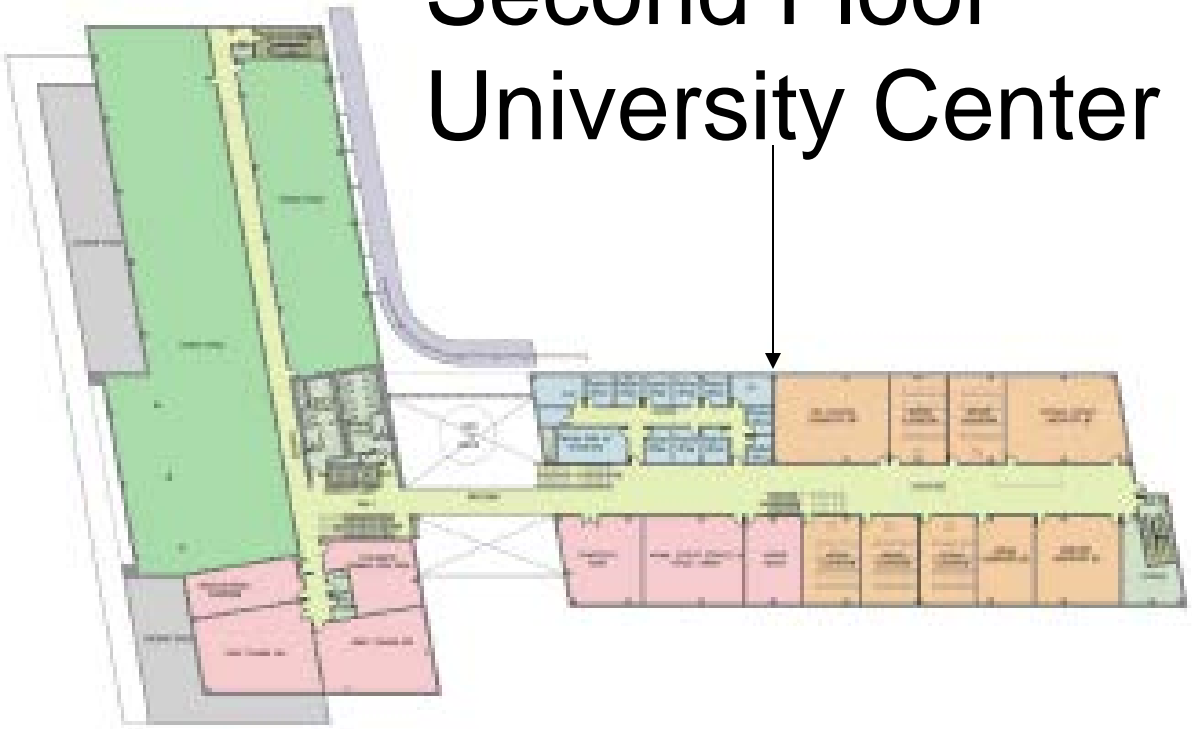

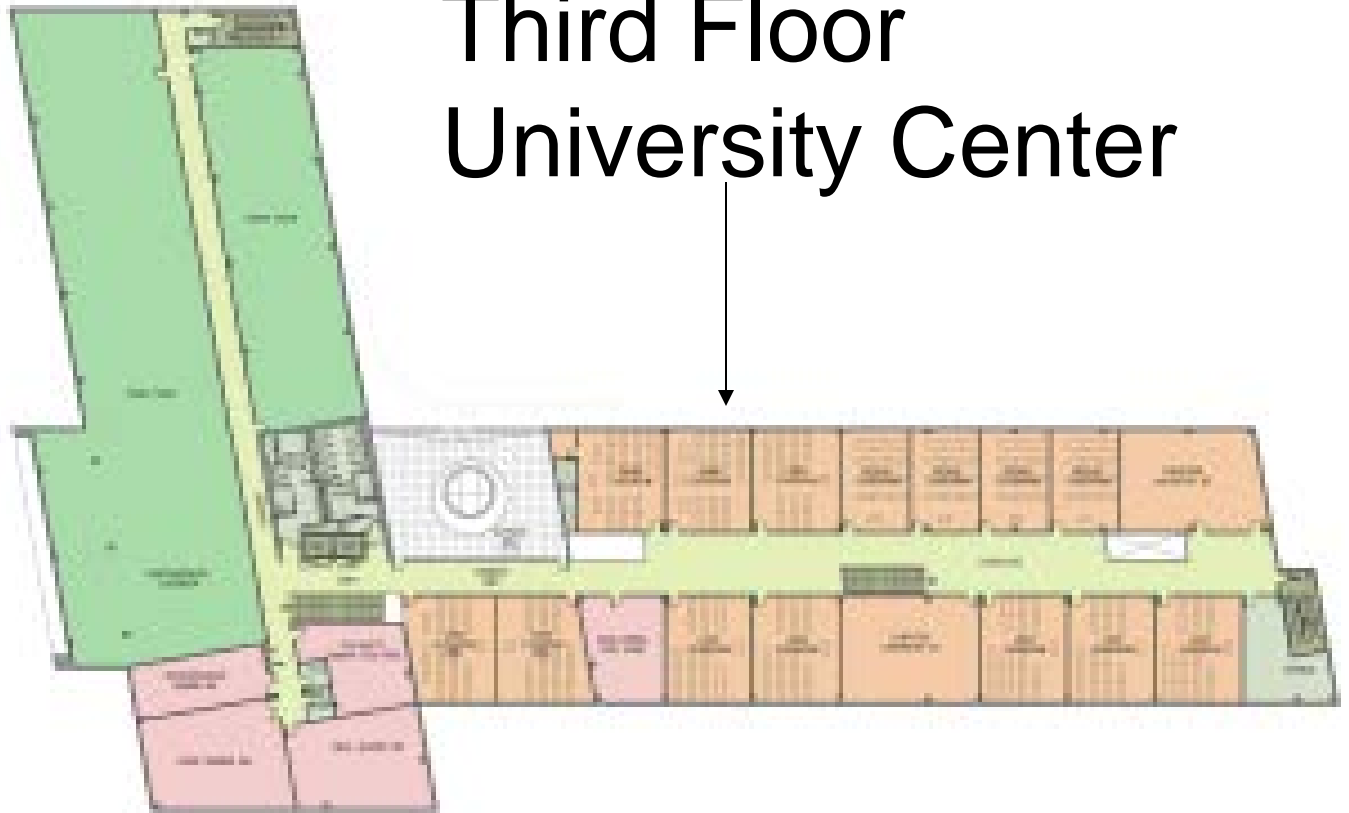

Permanent Campus

- The college plans to build six, two-story buildings on the site, totaling 240,000 square feet.
- Work will begin in 2008 with working drawings for the first building.
- At build out, the campus is designed to support 7,000 to 10,000 students.

Canyon Country Campus Progress

- The construction of the new ground-level amphitheater has been completed, ahead of schedule!
- The entry and exit into the main parking lot has been modified and the fire access road between the upper and lower pads has been completed.
- Recent additions to the campus include awnings on the modular buildings, an outside barbecue for Food Services, and a flagpole.
- Permanent railings are currently being installed on the stairways, and the split-rail concrete railings that will run along the roadways are in place.
- Planning has started on a ROPE/COPES course which is slated to be placed on the area adjacent to the bus drop-off.
- Re-signage of the campus took place in January including roadway, parking and building signage to more adequately meet the needs of the campus.
- The design of the campus monument is complete, and we are in the final phase of design on the entryway structure.

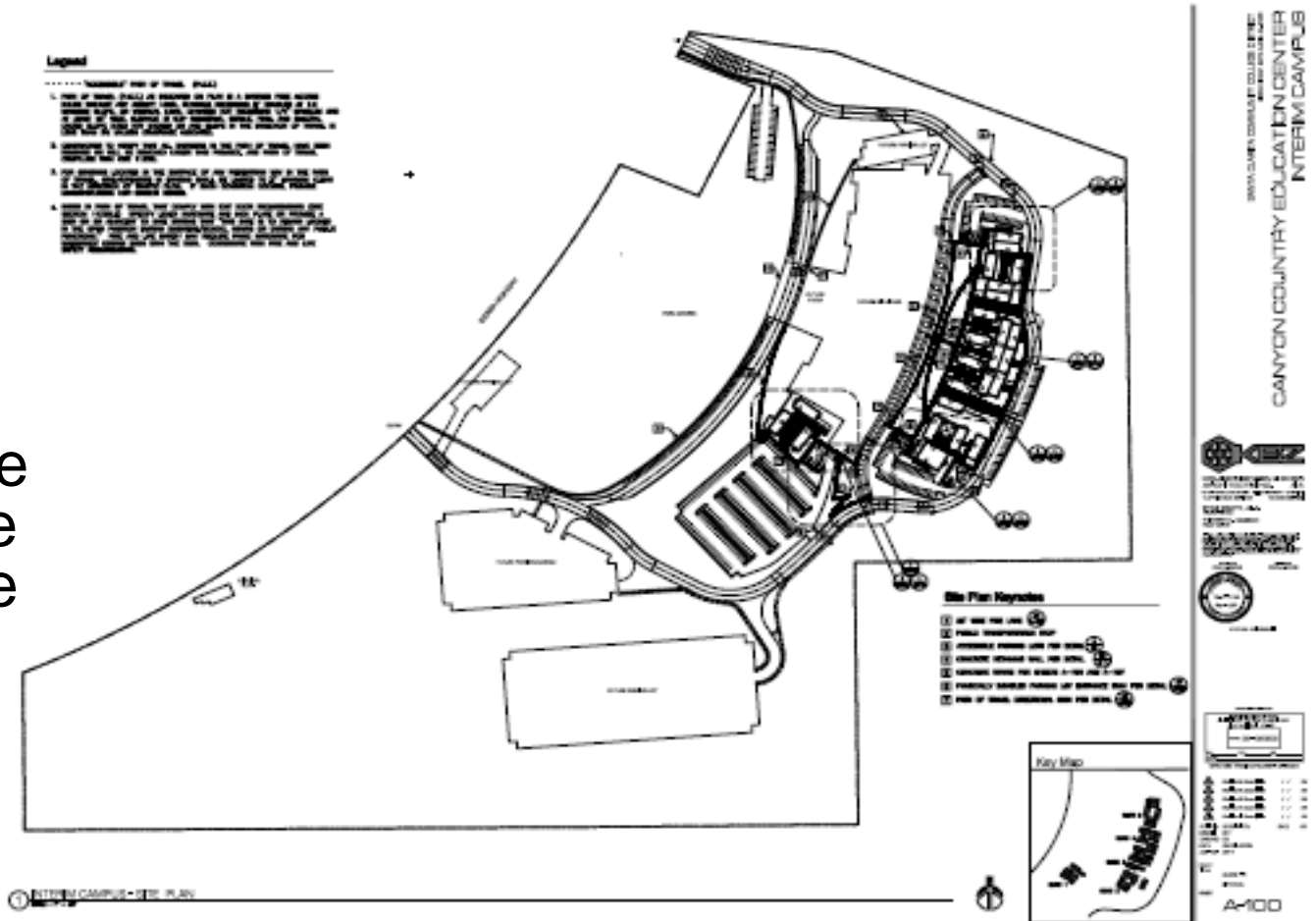

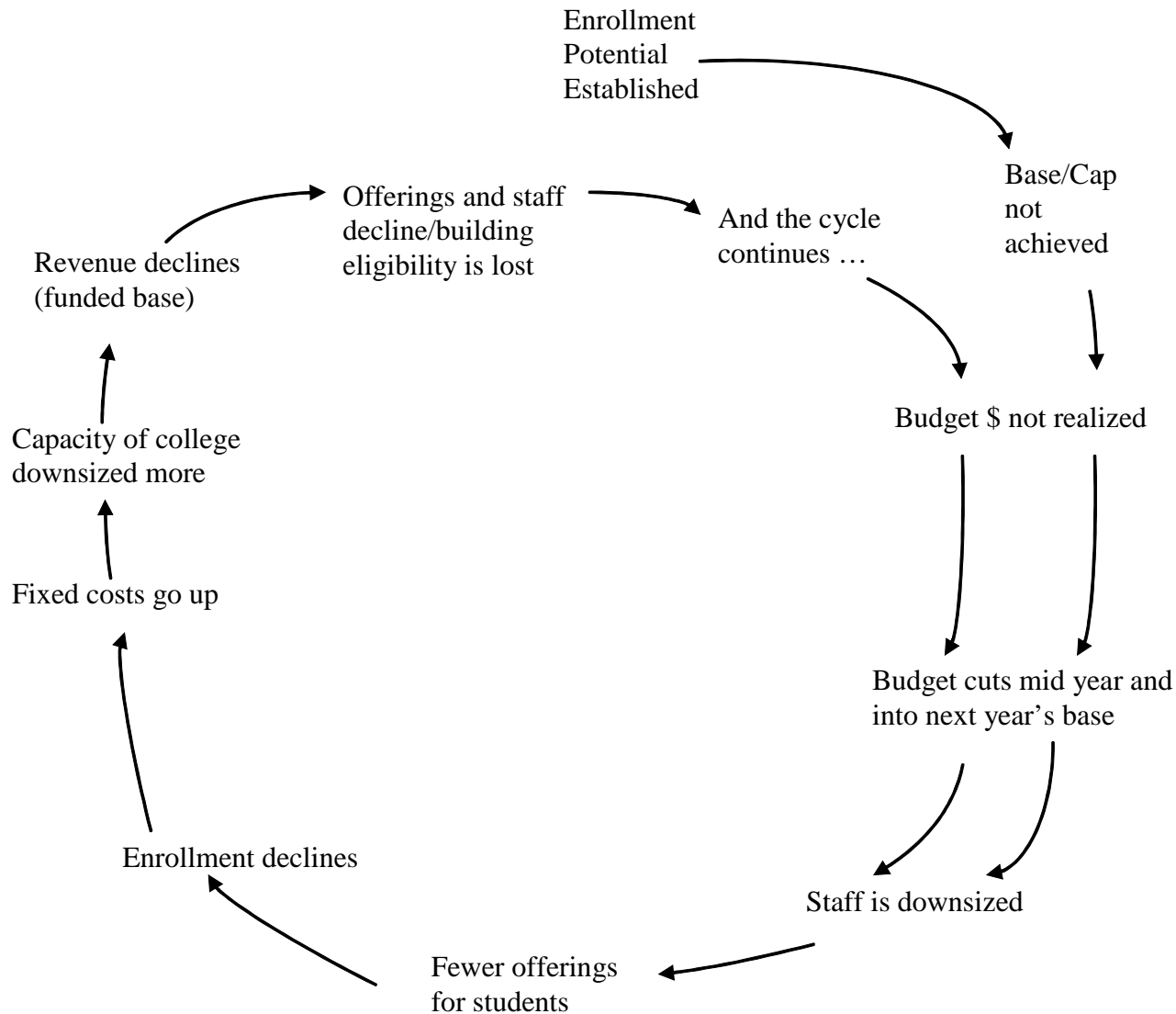

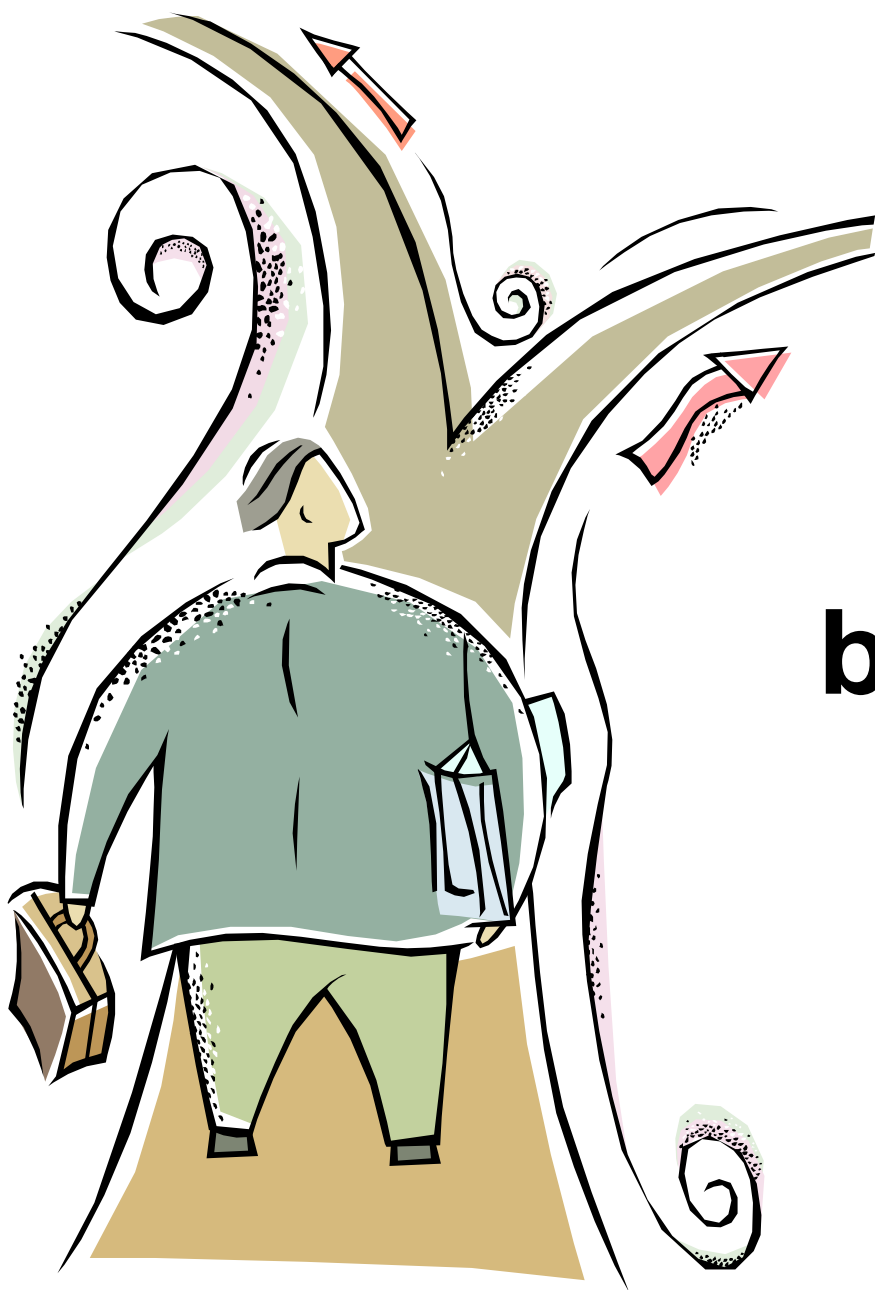

(Initiative Headed up by James Glapa Grossklag)

Nanotechnology

- Nanotechnology is a multi-disciplinary field of applied science and technology whose unifying theme is the control of matter on the atomic and molecular scale, normally 1 to 100 nanometers, and the fabrication of devices with critical dimensions that lie within that size range.
- COC will develop, implement and institutionalize a nanotechnology training program.
- The project is being funded by a US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration equipment grant of \$1.386, a State of California Community College Grant of \$540,000, and an equal amount of District and local matching funds.
- Curriculum will be multi-disciplinary covering areas in:

 - Nanomaterials
