

**Silver Spur, March 7, 2009**

**Comments by Dr. Dianne Van Hook**

Good evening. It is a pleasure to be here with you and to have shared in learning about the great love story of this wonderful couple, and their family.

Seeing those pictures of Council Bluffs took me back to my own childhood in rural Minnesota. There certainly is something to working on a farm that shapes a person's character. Among other things, it makes you humble, and keeps you true to your roots. Which is why, despite having lived in L.A. – the epicenter of celebrity and fame – for more than 40 years, Harold and Jacquie were so nervous about tonight. So, when their friends Cathy and Bill Kennedy asked them to support the COC foundation, Harold said, "It was not hard to transfer this affection and these memories into a desire to support College of the Canyons. Another love affair was under way."

They have joined us for many of our past celebrations to honor their friends who have received the award.
